
Three Servings of Milk Deliver A Unique Nutrient Package

Other foods used: large egg (50 g), whole, cooked, hardboiled (#01129); kale, raw (#11233); beans, kidney, California red, mature seeds, cooked, boiled without salt (#16031); pork, fresh, loin, sirloin (chops), bone-in, separable, lean only, cooked, broiled (#10058); nuts, almonds, whole (#12061); peppers, sweet, red, raw, sliced (#11821); broccoli, raw, chopped (#11090); fish, sardine, Atlantic, canned in oil, drained solids with bone (#15088), mushrooms, large, white, raw (#11260).



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
